CHOICE CHEATS 1 and 2

Amstrad Switch Production to UK

Alan Sugar, Amstrad's Chairman, has arranged a deal with GEC Plessey Telecommunications whereby computer production can be moved into the UK.

The manufacture of nearly 20 per cent of Amstrad's PC2286 and PC2386 machines is being moved from the Far East to GPT's Kirkcaldy plant.

Shipment of the PC2386 units has already commenced and the response from the corporate customer base has been very strong. It has long been Alan Sugar's wish to bring computer production to the UK but Amstrad wished to continue to offer highly competitive

products whilst retaining their margins. They are pleased that GTP are able to deliver volume supply of a high quality and at a satisfactory price. GPT will supply the system units and keyboards but the monitors will continue to be produced, for the meantime, in the Far East.

10,000 units a month will be produced at GPT and shipped to Amstrad's international distribution centre in Shoeburyness.

International sales accounted for over 57 per cent of Amstrad's sales turnover last year and, according to the latest figures from the independent market research company ROMTEC, held a 52 per cent share of the 2086 sector of the UK market in December last

G·O·O·D I-D-E-A-S

Have you got a brilliant invention but simply haven't got the money needed to go about turning your ideas into a profitable enterprise? Well a new seedcorn fund has been set up to specifically to help people with good technical ideas get their products onto the market.

Greater London Enterprise has put together Kickstart, a program that can provide finance from £5,000 to £25,000. The scheme is aimed at individual inventors and young technology firms.

Applicants have to be able to display technical competence as well as product potential. Also the ideas have to be realistic enough to be marketable.

£750,000 has been put aside for the scheme in London and it is hoped that the idea will take on in other parts of the country and throughout Europe.

COMPUTERISED **END TO** ANIMAL HARM

Manchester University have developed a BioEngine computer system that could replace testing drugs on animals thus saving thousands of lives. It can mathematically predict the behaviour of molecules when exposed to various drugs.

Many chemical manufacturers are searching for ways of designing drugs on computers rather than testing them on animals. The BioEngine has been developed and is to be marketed bearing these companies in mind.

★ HACKERS BEWARE ★

A top computer cop has pledged to track down every computer hacker as soon as hacking is made illegal.

Detective Inspector John Austin, the head of Scotland Yard's computer fraud squad claims that even the hobbyist won't be spared. They have access to very powerful equipment coupled with people who know what they are doing.

Hacking, as yet, is not illegal but given international trends and public opinion John Austin believes that it is only a matter of time. Anybody who illegally obtains information will end up in court!

It is believed that there is only three in Austin's team. However he has access to many technicians both inside and outside the police force who are willing to help. Austin also has experience in computing having worked in the industry prior to joining the men in blue.

There is a pool of qualified men ready to testify in court as PC experts can't be involved in cases involving mainframes. These technicians are able to go through a computer system and see if it has been broken into.

It is believed, however, that if the anti-hacking bill takes effect 90% of hacking will stop.

COMPUTER VIRUSES — AGAIN!

Recently there has been an increase in the reporting of computer viruses. Unfortunately although some occurances are nothing to do with a virus, some viruses do pose a real threat to computer users and is not something that just keeps journalists busy. (Remember the ITN News at Ten Broadcast on February the Twelfth this year which implied that all PC's would self destruct on the following morning — the thirteenth).

A computer virus is a program which has been designed to do anything from print a message on a screen to destroying the contents of a disc. The program has to be introduced into the system usually in the form of data transmission over a telecommunications network. Once the virus is in the system it can make copies of itself and write parts of itself into other programs causing discs to wipe themselves clean and the computer to bomb amongst other effects. These disruptions are not always intended to be malicious but the codes before it is installed. do prove to be a nuisance to users.

Viruses have been around for some time now though but have been called various names in the past including logic bomb, worm, hacking and time bomb. All, with the exception of hacking, were designed to cause damage or disruption to a system.

Educational establishments appear to be a breeding ground for viral attacks. Juveniles who believe that it is smart to make a computer wipe its own disc clean or print a humorous message amongst other functions are often at the root of the virus.

It is relatively easy to make a computer destruct data. I personally have heard about accountants writing accounts packages so that when their name is taken off the payroll the grammer or systems manager check be pretty safe.

Programmes that have been bought are usually safe. If your programmes are pirated from a third parties computer which has in turn been taken from a friends computer, then you are taking a risk. Finding the guilty party with this virus type programme isn't as easy. However, the people who find it fun to write these sort of programmes usually tell somebody about it. A student in America who hacked his way into NASA's computer was discovered in this way last year.

Hacking is different. Most 'hobby hackers' are content with having a look around your system. Others derive pleasure by moving files around the system.





Customers have been enquiring is produced. about machine code pro-

gramming, and have been wondering what software is needed to start. Well, machine code programming is quite complicated but there are tools available that make life easier. For example there is a discassembler program that accepts essential facility for debugging stored machine code programs. So you can actually have a look at how a commercial machine code program is written and learn from there. Other programs that can help are Compilers and Assemblers. Compilers are programs designed to translate a high level language source code (e.g. BASIC) into a corresponding machine code program. The compiler checks for, and reports, any syntax errors in the source program. If the source program is error free then

With the CPC machines the BASIC is actually interpreted line by line as soon as you type it in.

An assembler is a program that translates a source program written in a low level language (i.e. Forth) into machine code.
