

The main source at the moment appears to be the Amstrad Action cover tapes, although the supplied transfer program with the cover tapes seems to have settled down, so that the software can actually be transferred to disc.

Samurai Trilogy on the AA Cover Tape 47 will transfer with BONZO OPTION 1, but will not run, I am still looking at that one.

Although reported in the last issue of Scrapyard as a NO GO the game PICTIONARY is reported in the database as a Main File only transfer using Hackpack. The levels can be transferred using OPTION 1, there are about 50 of them, which come across as ANONAME, BNONAME, etc, but the main game code still accesses the levels from the tape. Anyone out there like to try to get it loading from the disc files? If so let me know, as I have had a few enquiries for a disc version of this particular game.

The only recent AA Cover Tape that does not seem to transfer was the Crossword Compiler on tape 43. I have tried it on both a 6128 and an Expanded 464, but no joy, even with the replacement transfer file from Cover Tape 44. So the best advice is to go to your friendly PD library and get it from them, and save all the hassle and time wasting.

Dave Muggeridge (The Trogg?) has given me a couple of snippets for games listed in the Bonzo database. It appears that when transferring the game SAVAGE to disc it needs the following loader, according to the old Bonzo Newsletters, those edited by Colin Harris, many moons ago.

OPENOUT "d":MEMORY 999:CLOSEOUT:LOAD "Filename":CALL 40960

It appears that this loader is needed for all four parts of the game, and that

consequently it will take two sides of the disc. The other is for RIGELS REVENCE, which is listed as a Hackpack transfer for some versions. The HP transfer does not include the screen file, but this is needed, as it contains information needed by the game to load. Dave's solution is to HP the game, then get the screen using a Multiface, and then set up a simple loader to run the resulting files.

Well here endeth the transfer news for this issue, not much I know. I have only a few tapes left to try of my own, and so far have not been that successful, so I need any information that you can send me ASAP. If there is anything else you think may be of interest then by all means send it in, someone out there is probably seeking just the info you have.

THE DISC TO DISC BACK-UP DATABASE

As readers of issue 11 will no doubt remember, I received an enquiry from Peter Curgenven as to whether a disc to disc back-up database would be an idea, as the tape to disc back-up was becoming a bit thin on the ground. Well after a bit of thought, I have started it. The main problem was to decide what back-up programs to use, I have settled for four of the commercial ones. They being Discology, CPC Procopy, Nirvana and XEXOR. I do know that there are now a few in the PD libraries, but as most of these four have been available for some time, I would assume that quite a few people have at least one of them.

Discology:

The latest version I think is 7.3, with different version numbers in English, French and German. Contains a Disc and File Copier plus an Editor program. Can be set up to copy from drives A-A, A-B, B-A, B-B. Also has the option of using the GAP 3 sector copier, which is usually needed for discs from French software houses. One thing I have found with this program if the disc you are trying to back-up has any corrupt sectors, then they will be copied along with the rest. Once you have set up the initial menu screens it plods away quite nicely until it has finished its job.

CPC Procopy:

Another proggie put out by Nemesis, sadly no longer available, as it has gone the same way as the Bonzo programs. As above can be set up to recognize the different combinations of disc drives in use. Also has the facility for allowing GAP 3 to be set for some discs that need this to be done. An early version I have also has a file on it called SPEEDMAS that needs to be run on Speedlok discs to allow the game to run properly. A later version does not give this option, so I assume that it is now catered for in the main program. There is also the usual disc map facilities.

Nirvana:

From Goldmark Systems, now only available on disc. Latest version is 2.1+ (and is probably my favourite). Automatically recognizes 2 drives and can, as above be set up for any drive variation. I would think this is the fastest of all these copiers, and needs very little setting up to use. It will either back-up a disc, or not, there is no alterations to be be fiddled with to try and get strange format discs. I will also recognize if you have extra memory expansions fitted to the computer, such as the the rear bank of memory on the 6128 or the 256K Ram Pack, and on a single disc drive with the 256K Ram Pack, will transfer a full side with no disc swapping. Both the disc and the excellent file copiers also work on the Plus machines. Thjere are also other utilities included on this disc including an archiver to tape program, although this will not work on the Plus machines.

XEXOR:

The newest of the four. Again drive variations are catered for, via the various menus. There are various programs on the reverse of the disc to use with different types of disc protection. Has what appears to be a standard

Back-up set up for a lot of normal discs. There is also a lot of extra utilities included to allow for setting up your own special formats to your own discs, all a bit beyond me though. There was I am told a certain alteration that can be made to a keyboard to bypass using some of the extra programs, it was called a 6K CopyMod, but if the service is still available I do not know at the moment. It was to enable the 6K sector discs to be backed up, but that is about all I know about it.

After that very brief resume of the four I have chosen to work with, I will explain the meaning of the letters in the columns following the back-up game name on the database following. The A in a column following the game name shows that the copier is just run in its standard mode, if need be setting up the source and destination drives first. The B means that some setting up needs to be done from the menus, i.e. GAP 3 being set in the case of CPC Procopy and Discology, or one of the utility files has been set up for XEXOR. The C is for XEXOR and for those owners who have had the 6K CopyMod, done to their machines.

If any one wants to send in information of back-ups made using other programs, then please feel free to do so, I will keep a note of them and include them in subsequent issues, but will not add them to this database. The information needed would be the same as for the tape back-ups: the game name, the software house that issued the particular game, the program used to make the back-up and any additional notes that may be needed to achieve a satisfactory working copy.

WELCOME TO NEW SUBSCRIBERS TO THE SCRAPYARD

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome any new subscribers to Bonzo's Scrapyard. The aim of the newsletter is to keep information up to date of any transfers of tape based software to run from a disc system, using primarily the Bonzo suite of programs. Bonzo Super Meddler, Hackpack and Bonzo Blitz, but also includes transfers made using the program Bankraid III. Bankraid III comes in two forms, one for 6128 users and the other for expanded 464 users, i.e. 464 plus 64K Ram pack and DDI I disc drive. I do not know if Bankraid will work on the later Plus machines as I do not have access to one of these, perhaps someone would let me know about that. Bankraid is the copyright of Neil MacDougall, but he has given permission that the Bankraid programs may be distributed to subscribers of Bonzo's Scrapyard only, it is NOT a Public Domain program, and therefore should not be passed around.

There is a database kept of all transfers made, currently it stands at over 1450 items, this also includes any software that will not transfer. See the section on the back page under the heading "The Bonzo's Scrapyard Team" for the relevant addresses. The object of the transfer is to allow faster loading of software, a few seconds instead of typing RUN" and then going off to make a brew, and for the better reliability of disc loading as opposed to the unreliable tape. The software is intended for use to make a working Back-up copy of the game, and not for the wholesale distribution of copies to all and sundry.

A recent discussion with Mr "Goldmark Systems", Brian Barton, (how are you Cur, sorry I mean SIR, mainly because he is bigger than I am, and I am a devout coward, I'll have to pretend not to be in the next time he drives past my house, heading for that big mole hole that has appeared down the road from me), thoughts were that the days of the cowpersons, is that politically correct nowadays?, that were ripping off games have probably passed and

that the CPC scene now lies in the hands of a more dedicated band of enthusiasts. So long may we all carry on using one of the best little machines around. It may be little on memory but its big on heart.

If anyone has any tape software, other than multiload programs, that they know are not on the database, please send any information on transfers, if successfully transferred to disc or even if its a NO GO, so that I can pass on the news. If you do not want to try them yourself, you can if you wish send them to me to try. But please enclose the tape, instructions, a disc for the transferred game and a jiffy bag with return postage.

HAVE YOU HEARD THE NEWS?

Goldmark Systems:

Brian Barton has been in touch since the last issue and asked that I clarify that the 8-bit printer port, that can be obtained from Goldmark, is actually built into a 1.5 metre printer lead. The KDS port, if you can find one, and the one from Brunning Software that comes with the Brunword Elite or ROM versions of Brunword are a separate item and you would also need to purchase a separate lead for these. I am also informed the the disc utility program Nirvana, see earlier mention, is now only available on disc, previously there was a combination of ROM and disc version. Goldmark still have on offer their own excellent tape to disc transfer programs, for those who still want these facilities and cannot get hold of the Bonzo ones. I can personally recommend their Speedtrans program for Speedlok games, and would advise anyone contacting Brian to ask for the Utilities Disc II. This disc contains the programs: Samson, which operates much the same as the Bonzo Option 1 program, and gives the opportunity of renaming the tape files as you proceed doing the backup; Delilah, for headerless files, as Bonzo Option 2, 2x, etc.; Playtrans and Firetrans, for Players and Firebird labels, a lot of these are listed on the Bonzo database as Hackpack transfers. There is also a Screen Dump program, with three different variations for different types of printers (Epson, Citoh, and Shinwa), plus a Screen Compactor program, and a Label Printer program. All in all a good disc of utilities. See the back page for address details.

W H Smith-the booksellers:

At the time of writing these pages, I am still trying to get hold of the latest, April, issue of AA, which was supposed to be on sale on the 20th May. Last weekend, while doing my usual rummage through the book shelves trying to find AA, I asked one of the assistants if it was actually out, Smiths being my only local output since AA decided to do away with their subscriptions, and was told that they are no longer carrying the mag. 'Can't get hold of it on a regular basis, and not much call for it either', was the excuse I was given. Is this a national decision, or is it just a local policy? Bonzo History in 8 BIT:

Speaking of 8 BIT, I have sent a small article on the history of the Bonzo newsletters to Brian Watson and hopefully it will be appearing shortly. Brian did tell me that he had a few letters about people being concerned that the content in 8 BIT seemed to be slanted towards the CPC, but I would think that this means the other 8 Bit User Groups and fanzine editors should think about supplying material on their own machines to redress the balance. We are very lucky on the CPC scene, in that we have some very competent people that have put together some excellent fanzines, magazines, call them what you will, over the years and in a lot of cases offered their help to us lesser mortals. I for one thank them all.

WACCI geared up for Convention: While speaking to Angie Hardwick, as mentioned earlier, she told me that the Great WACCI Convention in Walsall is now all set. I for one am going, and for those of you that are WACCI members, and have booked your place, I shall hopefully be able to put faces to to those that have written and phoned me in the past. From what I hear it sounds as though it will be a good meeting, with hopefully something for everyone to get something out of being a member of the CPC fraternity.

The Back Page:

As you will see on the back page of this newsletter, I have included names and addresses of certain publications and CPC peripheral suppliers. These are to ones that I have had personal dealings with and have found them all to have very good service, and a friendly attitude when you contact them. It is only a personal list and should not cast any aspertions on any other companies. You will probably have your own list of suppliers that give an exceptional service. The only thing I would ask is that we keep using them, as there have been a few very good companies that have now left the CPC scene, and we do need to hang on to the few that are standing by us, despite unfortunately, an ever decreasing sales enclave.

Compilers Quest:

Once again I will mention that I am in need of information from yourselves for sanything that you feel could be included in forthcoming newsletters. At present I am scouring my local boot fairs in search of any software that can be added to the Bonzo database, but they are few and far between. It is probably better to send a letter, although my phone number is on the back page, as it gives me a bit longer to try to find a solution.
