

Many of the tasks were relatively simple storage and retrieval of information.


Dr Potter commented: "We said: 'We can do that in a pocket computer.' So we've brought down information handling to pocket size. It makes the card index totally obsolete.'

encourage information providers like Time Out and the Good Food Guide to produce pre-programmed cartridges.

Powered by a PP3 nine volt battery, The Organiser has a 16-character LCD display and a slide-off protective case. It has 36 calculator-style keys, set out as A-Z and not QUERTY.

Dr Potter said it had taken £1m to develop what he described as the world's first practical pocket computer.

The computer can hold two cartridges, each measuring about 2in by 1in by ½in.

Psion had a demonstration cartridge holding restaurant details which can be searched by name, address, postal district, nearest station, speciality, opening hours and pricing. This is done by pressing FIND, entering the request and pressing the EXECUTE key.

Each record, of up to 200 characters, scrolls across the

display.

Dr Potter said he expected The Organiser to appeal to a wide cross-section of people, including students managers, engineers, sales people and accountants.

The first cartridge software packs, at £29.95 each, are for science, maths and finance. Blanks, which can be reused after re-formatting up to 100 times, cost £19.25 for 16K and £12.95 for 8K.

The formatter, using ultra violet, will cost about £44 or shops will charge about £3.50 to re-format a cartridge.

Also available on cartridge will be a simple programming language called POPL, which uses four commands and also offers maths, scientific and other functions.

Psion promised soon more programs for spreadsheets and other specialist applications and RS232 (£25) and printer drivers.

The Organiser, which uses Hitachi's CMOS HD6031X eight-bit microprocessor, measures about 51/2 by 3in by 11/4in. It is claimed that data will be retained for 50 years, even with the battery disconnected.

 Psion also gave details of its new range of business software, called Xchange, which allows users to switch between various tasks and share information between them.

They are promised for August for the IBM PC, Apricot and Sirius 1 (Victor other computers to follow in I late autumn.

The four programs, developed along with Psion's QL software, are Quill for word processing, Abacus for financial planning and Easel for graphics, all at £175, and Archive for database database management (£250). Bought as a package they cost £495. Psion, 22 Dorset Sq. London NWI 60G

recorder, you can choose an additional three Acornsoft programs. Pick out your titles from a specified list.

Peter O'Keeffe, Acorn sales director, said: "Our July offer is designed to stimulate new purchases in what is typically a relatively quiet period for consumer sales throughout the computer industry.

"The BBC has been consistently popular with 350,000 units sold to date and worldwide sales running on average at 20,000 a month."

However, David Greenstein, managing director of Twickenham Computer Centre, expressed doubts as to whether the bargain would pull in many new buyers.

"Special offers don't make too much of an impact", he said. "Perhaps they will prove the decisive factor for people who are hesitating between two computers, but I don't think they tend to attract customers who weren't already considering buying a computer,"

Mr Greenstein refuted the suggestion that Acorn might be promoting the BBC to counteract the strong position of the Commodore in the market.

'The BBCs are extremely popular, and in fact outsell the Commodore at 100 to 1, at least in my shop," he said. "In a good month we sell 700 or 800 BBCs.

Mr Greenstein was enthusiastic in his praise for the BBC: "It's excellent value for money," he said. "It's really comparable to the Apple, which lots of people don't take into account. The BBC gives you extra ports. In fact it's a cheap machine for what you get.

"There's never been anything on the market to compare with it," he concluded.

#### Atari sold

Commodore's ex-boss Jack Tramiel has bought most of Atari, makers of the home computers and games players. Mr Tramiel and his group,

Tramiel Technology, are said to have paid £178m for Atari, a loss-making part of Warner Communications.

As Atari's chairman, James Morgan, emptied his desk in Santa Clara, California, some executives said Mr Morgan had not been given enought time to cure the company's losses, which reached about £240m last year.

Warner had been trying to sell Atari to Philips, the big Dutch electronics group.

Mr Tramiel, founder of Commodore International, left Commodore after internal wrangling.

# This is serious

I thought I'd start out this week with a few observations about software trends. Seriously, folks, software is turning serious, even for the home market. When you walk into the average California retail computer store, you are no longer overwhelmed by the number of video games and game-playing machines as was the case as little as two years ago.

Most of the customers are different too. Instead of lots of teens and pre-teens with joysticks in their hands, you now see lots of serious-looking young adults with chequebooks in their hands. Although the games are still there, the emphasis has shifted away to more no-fooling-around types of applications, such as household management packages as well as educational

programs.

Even on the telly and in the consumer magazines this change in emphasis is clearly observed. No longer do computer ads feature youths in high excitement blasting away at alien invaders or sending other sorts of video characters scampering across the screen in exchange for high scores (and little else). These days ads are more inclined to feature the likes of Alan Alda (of MASH fame) extolling the praises of Atari word processing programs, or seeing some typical family sending Junior off to college fully equipped with CBM 64. Games still account for a large percentage of the market, but marketing people as well as retailers themselves are spreading the message that there is a lot more to home computing than playing games. It is certainly about time!

One prominent example of this shifted emphasis is what Atari has been doing lately. Once the undisputed king of video and computer games, it has been hitting TV and print ads hard pushing their new home-oriented word processor, AtariWrite. It is also working hard on producing a letter quality printer that

will retail, it hopes, around \$350.

Coleco too is trying to rid itself of its game playing image with its Adam computer. Even though the basic unit constitutes a reworked video game machine, it still comes with a built-in word processor and is being pushed as a serious system.

Here's an interesting item which testifies to the growth and complexity of the micro world. There is now a magazine out called Magazine Guide. You read that right too. The full name is actually Magazine Guide To Personal Technology Publications! Are you ready for that? Personal Technology no less.

Actually, as I read the introduction from the editor, it sounds as though it might be worthwhile to subscribe, at least for a limited period. The main thrust of the publication is to review what magazines are available for what purposes, and to actually make it possible for readers to get sample copies of magazines before they subscribe. This can be a real advantage, as it is often so hard to tell the contents of a magazine by its title. In the issue of the guide that I was sent, no less than 50 magazines were reviewed, some in capsule form and some in depth. One of the articles was devoted to magazines oriented strictly toward the Commodore machines. Needless to say, virtually every advertiser that had bought space in the Guide was a publisher of some sort of magazine.



A disappointing version of Space Invaders. You move a laser base left and right across the bottom as rows of aliens drop bombs. At intervals a mother ship zooms across the top, sometimes launching an extremely speedy bomb.

The instructions on the insert warn that the aliens must be hit dead-centre if they are to be killed. In the trade this is known as calling a bug a feature. In fact your shots sometimes go right through the middle of a column without claiming a life. At other times a shot which completely misses will nonetheless kill an invader. Enemy bombs are dropped directly on your base, Enemy bombs are and you can't shoot them down.

The display is dull, with a yellow base and green aliens on a blue background. The enemies change colour as they near the bottom. Curiously, explosions are in black and white. Sound is reasonable.

Continental Raiders seems to have been a rush job - even the name Continental Software is mis-spelled on the title page, where the game is called Cosmic Raiders. If Memotech must revive old game ideas there's really no excuse for doing it this sloppily. S.N.G.



Although these tasks tend to be executed relatively slowly on the unexpanded TI they are performed considerably faster when the program is run in Extended Basic, If a printer is attached then a copy of your calculations may be obtained.

Each number in your calculation is entered separately followed by the sign for the funtion to be performed. Both of these are kept in memory should either need to be corrected. If an input error has been made this may be corrected at any stage and the entire calculation is automatically changed.

Although there is no fault with the design or running of the program, I can't really see the program being of great value to the average user. Unless you need to make regular long and complicated calculations then it's hardly a worthwhile investment. In the time taken to load and run the program then enter the numbers you could have checked and re-checked answers obtained from a calculator or even your own brain power.

I am writing in reply to C.R. Underwood's letter (HCW 66) about Jet Set Willy.

As the game stands it is impossible to reach the conservatory roof because of a bug.

You have to jump into the middle of the Banyan tree and then jump back again. But there is an orange block in the way that stops you.

To remove this block you have to do the following: MERGE the loader. When this is done, type CLEAR 32767: LOAD "" CODE. Press PLAY and the code will load but won't run. When loading is complete, type the following: POKE 60231,0:POKE

42183,11:POKE 59901,82: POKE 56876,4

You could also POKE 35899,0 to give yourself unlimited lives, or it could be added at line 35 in the loader or left out altogether.

#### standard?

The Japanese have strange preoccupation with standards. We have seen the standards. We have seen the struggle for a standard video cassette format. Why? Well, from the manufacturer's point of view, if your system is adopted the yens come rolling in. Although standardization seems good for the consumer (in the case of video you get a wider range of pre-recorded cassettes if you have the VHS system) it does have a couple of rather worrying side-effects for the computer industry. Firstly, what does MSX mean?

When the MSX standard was decided upon, the wellknown companies, such as Sony, JVC, Yamaha, etc wanted to produce cosmetically different microcomputers which were software-compatible. The idea of lacing your JVC Invaders from the Planet Zorg cartridge into your micro seems very appealing; after all, if JVC stopped producing its machine you could still use Sony software.

There are two serious disadvantages to the MSX system. Firstly, because the machines are the same, there will be no need for the multitude of software houses which exist at present. This results in some of the most skilled software authors becoming government employees, i.e. on the dole.

However, reason I criticize MSX is because it will ruin small companies like Sinclair Research, Acorn and Dragon Data. The large companies are not interested in designing new machines, only making money. If MSX is adopted, machines like the Sinclair QL won't be produced and new technology will become old hat, a bit like the North Sea oil boom which faded

So let us forget MSX and get on with the serious business of producing existing and new useful machines.

Here's my view of One Man's View (HCW 67) about selling software.

DC is lucky to have so many chairs and hats. We lesser mortals must struggle with one or two. I must admit I'm a frustrated software author and nonexpert. I want to point out to DC that the likes of Jeff Minter started with their own small business, producing material which I'm sure he would admit does not meet his standards now. This aside, how do you become an expert?

Knowing what large software houses sell, they seem to think that a game won't sell unless it's a variation of Pac-Man, Space Invaders or Donkey Kong.

Software houses dictate what will be in the shops. There is a saying "one man's meat is another man's poison." I'm a plumber by trade and 35 years old. I have owned a VIC-20 for 18 months and a 16K Spectrum for a few months. There seem to be no programs for the 16K Spectrum so why is it on the market?

When I first had my VIC-20 I spent every spare moment using it, including playing games. After some months I began to think that all software was designed for one or two players, so I decided to write a family quiz game.

After writing versions for the VIC-20 and Spectrum, I tested the game on family and friends. All were very enthusiastic and felt it had

potential. I sent the game to Virgin who rejected it. I thought I'd try elsewhere. I phones Dream of Basingstoke and explained the game. "No," was the answer, "we wouldn't be interested in that type of

It annoyed me that about a week later I read an article by Nick Alexander about Virgin's move into board games. "Board games certainly have more value, socially, than computer games," said Nick Alexander. If he feels that way, why not produce programs with "social value"? This may sound like sour grapes, but I assure you it's not.

Back to DC's comments there is a great deal of rubbish published by the large software houses. I find most of the games published need the reactions of Superman if you want to see all levels. It seems to me software sales would increase if games started easy, becoming gradually harder so that everybody could at least see all of the game. We would then all be amazed at the experts' experts' programming, instead of being frustrated. There must be thousands of neglected in games cupboards due frustration.
